The CoE Participates in the International Workshop on the Monitoring of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)



The International Workshop on the Monitoring of the SDGs was jointly hosted by the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD) and the National Bureau of Statistics of China (NBS), 12-13 January 2022 remotely.

The workshop gathered national statistical offices (NSOs) in Asia and the Pacific and the statisticians working on SDG monitoring in the Chinese counterpart.

Monitoring and reviewing progress made towards SDGs is critical to achieve the 2030 for Agenda Sustainable Development. Various panelists emphasized the importance of relevant, high-quality disaggregated data to monitor 2030 Agenda. Moreover. the NSOs also shared the difficulties posed in statistical operations due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, coming with up efficient solutions to overcome challenges in data collection.

The workshop consisted of four overarching themes and six sessions. The themes included SDG global indicator framework and monitoring SDGs, data innovations and initiatives, leaving no one behind and data disaggregation, and finally National SDG monitoring: sharing experiences.

In the fifth session on data innovations and initiatives for SDGs, Hyun Jung Park, CoE Coordinator, gave a presentation on "New Opportunities in Crime Statistics for Monitoring SDGs".

Ms. Park explained the role of the CoE in advancing the usage of criminal justice data and its roles carrying out the in UN-CTS, implementing the Korean Classification of Crime for Purposes Statistical (KCCS), monitoring SDGs and the CoE's mission as a Knowledge and Innovation Hub in the region, national technical providing assistance, regional training as well as conducting research and innovation. She introduced three examples of national innovation including Smart Policing Intelligence Network (SPIN), Smart Policing Big Data Platform and Crime Layout Understanding Engine (CLUE). She emphasized the necessity of applying new, non-traditional methods of data collection of crime statistics for SDGs.

CoE, UNODC, and SIAP successfully conclude the 'Second Online Course on Crime Statistics from a Gender Perspective'



As part of continued efforts to enhance for awareness prioritizing the development and use of crime statistics from a gender perspective, United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), the CoE and UN Statistical Institute of Asia and the Pacific (SIAP) launched the 'Second Online Course on Crime Statistics from Gender а Perspective' (CSGP 2022).

The E-Learning course was held from 14 February to 20 March as self-administered interactive а training. The course comprised of four modules: Module 1 provided basic concepts of crime and gender, data sources and methodological tools; Module 2 introduced the of metadata relevant SDGs for more effective

data collection of genders in crime; Module 3 analysed data collection on gender in criminal justice system; and Module 4 showcased the utilization of 'R' to compute SDG indicators.

The course had a total of 232 persons from 36 Member States worldwide with 90 percent of participants 'agreeing' or 'strongly agreeing' that the training effectively enhanced their skills and knowledge.

An expert-led webinar was held on 14 February 2022, to provide introductory information on subject content and technical the quidance on learning for the users. platform The webinar offered expert insights into gender dimensions of crime, gender mainstreaming, genderrelated killing of women and girls, a methodological tool for crimegender statistics, and the Elearning course. Furthermore, the event provided an arena for discussion amongst experts, lecturers. course and participants.

Welcoming remarks were given by the moderator Enrico Bisogno, Chief, UNODC Data Development

and Dissemination Section, Hyun Jung Park, CoE Coordinator, and Shailja Sharma, SIAP Director. Hyun Jung Park highlighted the importance of "[Providing] an environment where participants can discuss and learn more about gender concepts and frameworks on SDG indicators relevant to crime and criminal justice statistics including targets." gender-based SDG Shailja Sharma shed light on the importance inter-agency of partnerships in delivering the stating that course "Member States are able to produce highquality, reliable indicators to monitor relevant Sustainable Development Goals".

The CoE plans to continue strengthening regional capacity in producing high-quality data for crime-gender based SDG targets and overall statistics, to inform policymakers at national and international level.

CoE Participates in the Global Social Work Innovation and Collaboration for a Fair and Inclusive Society Forum



The Global Social Work Innovation and Collaboration for a Fair and Inclusive Society forum was hosted by Yonsei University, 13-16 May 2022, with attendants joining both remotely and in person.

The prevention of Gender-based Violence (GBV), specifically Violence Against Women (VAW), is a serious area of concern globally but particularly in the Asia-Pacific region, and data availability at the national level is extremely limited. As these topics continue to be at the top of the global agenda, it is of paramount importance that all sectors of society come together to advocate for the prevention of VAW and address narratives which seek to delegitimise VAW.

The offered program panel presentations and discussions on building inclusive communities. fostering social systems, support and establishing measures to tackle VAW. The forum was divided into four sessions, grouped according to theme: Perspectives on Building Inclusive Communities, Preventing Violence Against Women, Rising Scholars for Future Social Work, and Outlook on Improving Health and Skills in Practice.

The speakers and panelists of the forum included academics and researchers from Yonsei University and the University of Liverpool, practitioners interested in various aspects of inclusive police force societies and representatives, who shared examples of best practice in data collection and initiatives to tackle and VAW related inequality issues.

The CoE participated in a session the topic of "Preventing on Violence Against Women" to better understand challenges in the Asia-Pacific region and to initiatives, present UNODC methodological tools and data collection methods related to VAW and GBV. Seong Jae Shin, CoE Research Officer, presented "Equality Through on Measurement: Crime and Gender Data in Asia and the Pacific", addressing the challenges in data collection in the areas of VAW and GBV and presenting the initiatives employed by the CoE for the facilitation of collection of GBV-related data.

Following the presentation, Hyun Jung Park, CoE Coordinator, partecipated in the panel as a discussant, engaging the presenters inquiring about the reliability and quality of the surveys used by the researchers and police force to collect data on VAW.

The forum provided a space to strengthen the partnership between the CoE. academia and practitioners in the field of crime and criminal justice statistics. The CoE plans continue to expanding its partnerships and advocating for the importance of justice crime and criminal for statistics the basis as evidence-based policymaking.

2022 Data Collection Cycle – Online Briefing for Asia and the Pacific



Annually United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) launches Data Day for countries to collect and provide drug and crime data to the Office. The data collections are a centralised opportunity for Member States to collect data that will help identify crime patterns and trends for crime prevention, analysis of crime victimization national survey implementation, national examination of criminal justice system performance, information flow and inter-agency collaboration in the crime statistics system. The surveys also align with the standardized definitions of the International Classification of Crime for

Statistical Purposes (ICCS) and are used to directly collect data for crime-related Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). In total, five questionnaires are provided to national Focal Points:

- Annual Report Questionnaire (ARQ)
- Individual Drug Seizures (IDS)
- United Nations Survey of Crime Trend and Operations of Criminal Justice Systems (UN-CTS)
- Illicit Arms Flows
 Questionnaire (UN-IAFQ)
- Questionnaire for the Global Report on Trafficking in Persons (GLOTIP)

The CoE supports UNODC Headquarters in Vienna, Austria, during each annual Data Collection Cycle to enhance the quality and quantity of responses to the UN-CTS, UN-IAFQ and GLOTIP in the Asia-Pacific region. These three surveys facilitate the submission of data to a total of 10 SDG Indicators in Goal 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities and Goal 16: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions.

To enhance responses for the 2022 Data Collection Cycle, UNODC held regional briefings for national UN-CTS Focal Points, Alternative Focal Points and other parties relevant to the crime statistics system in each geographic region; the CoE led the first regional Briefings for Asia and Pacific region.

The online Briefing began with an introduction from Moderator Matthew Harris-Williams, Regional Liaison Officer, CoE before an overview of UNODC Global Data Collections from David Rausis, Statistician, UNODC Data Development and Dissemination Section who also introduced the UN-CTS, followed by Camelia Abdelgelil, Consultant. UNODC Data **Development and Dissemination** Section who presented on the IAFQ and Marie Jane Fatiaki, Social Affairs Officer, UNODC Fiji Office who introduced GLOTiP. The session also featured a regional overview of SDG progress and its relationship with the Data Collections. Finally, a Question-and-Answer Session addressed participant questions regarding comments and national.

The Briefing had a total of 38 participants from 15 countries: Australia; Federated States of Micronesia Fiji; Indonesia; Kiribati; Malaysia; Maldives; Mongolia; Pakistan; Philippines; Republic of Palau; Republic of Korea; Samoa; Singapore; and Thailand.

The Centres of Excellence host International Classification of Crime for Statistical Purposes (ICCS) Meetings between Asia and Latin America



The International Classification of Crime for Statistical Purposes (ICCS) Meetings were jointly organized by the CoE, UNODC and UNODC-INEGI Center of Excellence in Statistical Information on Government, Crime, Victimization and Justice (UNODC-INEGI CoE), 25-26 May 2022, in Mexico City.

As part of UNODC's commitment to optimize crime and criminal justice statistics, the ICCS was developed as a methodological tool based on internationally agreed concepts, categories and definitions aiming to improve the consistency and international comparability of crime and criminal justice statistics. The ICCS also enables countries to produce high quality data to report and measure the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) indicators under UNODC mandate in the areas of crime, violence, justice, and rule of law.

The ICCS Meetings included two Engagement sections. and Technical Exchange. The 'ICCS Meeting' Engagement was opened by Enrico Bisogno, Chief of the Data Development and **Dissemination Section, Research** Analysis and Trend Branch, UNODC, Oscar Jaimes Bello,

General Director for Government, Statistics, Crime and Justice National Institute of Statistics Geography of Mexico and (INEGI), and Hyang Woo Jeong, **Director-General for Coordination** and Planning, Statistics Korea (KOSTAT). Representatives from Argentina, Colombia, Mexico and the Republic of Korea in various stages of ICCS implementation were invited to showcase the process of adopting the ICCS, as well as the obstacles and lessons learned. Bahrain, Mongolia and UAE, which have expressed interest in ICCS implementation, also participated.

'ICCS Technical The Meeting' was organized for Republic of Korea and Mexico to exchange knowledge on technical aspects of ICCS implementation in the following day. Through this meeting, the CoE understood insights the national in implementation process of Mexico and Republic of Korea, identified common challenges in the varying stages of the ICCS implementation, and discussed policy implications and future steps to improve the ICCS implementation Manual.

The meetings provided a space to re-engage counties involved in ICCS implementation and to their understand process in national contexts, as well as to strengthen the partnership between the CoEs and the two countries. The CoE plans to expand on these meetings by organizing regional ICCS meetings engagement and continue engaging with Member States interested the in implementation process.

New Publication: Regional Snapshot 2 – Prison Population in South-eastern Asia.



The CoE released the Regional Snapshot 2 – Prison Population in South-eastern Asia.

The South-eastern Asia prison population showed the largest increase from 2000 to 2019 among subregions in Asia and the Pacific. In 2019, approximately 1.19 million people in South-eastern Asia were detained in prison, a rise of 120% since 2000.

order to understand the In dynamics of imprisonment in the Asia-Pacific region, the CoE has been publishing the series of the Regional Snapshot — Prison Population, addressing the prison-related issues; prison population, unsentenced share, and overcrowding.

The first edition provided a regional overview of the issues, and the second is focusing on these topics in South-eastern Asia.

As part of its commitment to improving the collection and use of crime statistics for evidencebased policymaking, the CoE will continue to deliver statistical information on crime and criminal justice in the region to a actors including variety of policymakers and the general public.

CoE participates in the 7th Korean Crime Victim Survey Conference



The Seventh Korean Crime Victim Survey was organized jointly by the Korean Criminological Association (KCA) and the Korea Institute of Criminology and Justice (KICJ), 17 June 2022 in Seoul, Republic of Korea.

The conference gathered academics in the field of crime and criminal justice and experts from KICJ, carrying out the 'National Public Safety Survey', the Korean Crime Victim Survey, to share and exchange research findings using the 2020 CVS data and the challenges of conducting the survey during the Covid-19 pandemic.

The conference consisted of two sessions: the 2020 National Crime Victim Survey, and Crime Trends and Victimization Aspects in the Covid-19 situation. At the first session, Jisu Kim, the Data Analysis Officer of the CoE, presented on 'Korea National Public Safety Survey for Internationally Comparable Victimization Survey'.

During her presentation, Jisu Kim explained UN data crime surveys, UNcollection flows: CTS, and SDGs indicators to emphasize why international comparative data collection is important in crime and criminal justice statistics. SDG 16 Survey Initiative, developed by UNODC, UNDP, and OHCHR to measure survey-based progress on indicators under Goal 16 of the Sustainable Development Goals including crime victimization, provided was practical as examples to enhance the survey questionnaires of Korea CVS.

The conference provided a good opportunity for the CoE to strengthen ties with Academics and the national institutions for future collaboration in the Korean National Crime Victim Survey.
